She was asked to serve on the Carson-Newman School Counselor Graduate Program Advisory Committee again this year. Kitty was honored to be asked to be a faculty adviser on the New PTO Board at Northwest Middle School. She was selected to be on the Knox County Middle School Counselors' Advisory Board. She was also chosen this summer as the Ethics Chairman for the Tennessee Counseling Association, and she will be serving on the TCA Leadership Council. Great job Kitty.

Knoxville chapters decided to study the grant-in-aid to determine the cost of the contribution, the value to the student, and the classification of the student to whom it was given each year. Each Knoxville DKG Chapter contributed \$300 at this time for the grant-in-aid.

Programs included glimpses of other countries, book reviews, women's role in our world, and changesin education, society and the world.

The theme for the 1971-75 year was "Changing Times." Each year the state and local themes dealt with changes we were experiencing in education and the world. In the 1970-71 year the theme was "Action toward Better Living." In 1971-72, the theme was "Changing Times-Challenge or Dilemma." In 1975, the state stressed "Positive Leadership for Purposeful Action" and encouraged members to take an active role in educational leadership.

During the 1970's, in an effort to help members become better acquainted, Zeta chapter established a mystery member feature in the monthly newsletters. When one of Zeta's members suffered damage to her home due to flooding, both Zeta and International provided assistance.

The chapter looked for a permanent storage for DKG records. All three chapters secured a place at the YMCA.

One of the service projects was to help the Vardy School in Hancock County. Magazine subscriptions were purchased for each student.

Dr. Roy Wallace, Knoxville City School Superintendent spoke to the group about trends in continuing education. Martha Begella, Coordinator of Women's Activities, shared with the group "A New Look at Sex Roles and Stereotypes and the Implications for Educators." Carolyn Jensen, YMCA, talked with the chapter about opportunities for volunteering in the community. There were many program topics generated from the theme of "Change".

Legislation

The State Board of Education (SBE) met on Oct. 20 and approved several items on first reading, including the following:

<u>High School Policy 2.103</u>: Item to adopt an <u>alternate academic diploma</u> for students assessed on the alternate assessment and update requirements for graduation with distinction

<u>Administrative Rules: State Special Schools, Rule 0520-04-03</u>: Item to update the <u>criteria for admission</u> to the Tennessee School for the Blind, Tennessee School for the Deaf, and West Tennessee School for the Deaf

<u>Tennessee Early Learning Development Standards (TN ELDS)</u>: Item to update the <u>Tennessee Early Learning Development Standards</u>

<u>Promotion and Retention Policy 3.300</u>: Item to update the <u>promotion and retention policy</u> to focus on supporting student promotion rather than retention—outlines requirements schools and districts must take prior to a retention decision

<u>Alternative Educator Programs Policy 2.302</u>: Item to update the policy to remove outdated information and include <u>best practices for alternative schools</u>

Education in Knox Co Schools

Knox County Superintendent, Bob Tomas, spoke at the Knox Co Retired Teacher Association on September 28, 2017. The three goals for Knox Co Schools is Increasing Student Achievement, Creating A Positive Culture, and Eliminating Disparities in Education.

Under the first goal increasing student achievement there is an increase on personalized learning, reading proficiency of all students, the percentage of students who are college and career ready, graduation rates, post secondary opportunities. The state goal is 75% of the student to be reading proficient by 2025. To be college and career ready the student must score at least 21 on the ACT. There is a 50% chance a college student will make at least make a "C" on entrance level college course if they score 21 on the ACT. They will also be career ready. There is an Aspire pilot test being given to middle school student. Preparing for the ACT starts in the elementary schools. 2017 graduation rate was 89% for Knox Co Schools.

The second goal of creating a positive culture includes the research department sending out a survey to the staff about Knox Co Schools environment. The administration is here "to serve". There has been a lot of discussion about the TEAM evaluation. The rubric is suppose to show growth. There is a new evaluation model called TIGER (Teacher Instructional Growth for Effectiveness and Results) which is being piloted in the Maryville schools system. I have found out that some Knox Co Schools are testing this evaluation this year. This would be a year long evaluation. There needs to be a positive and caring relationship with students and parents. The administration must have the same relationship with staff members. There are 8,000 Knox Co Schools employees and 60,000 students.

The third goal of eliminating disparities in education includes closing achievement gaps within subgroups, increasing the professional growth of teacher in the area of cultural competence, increasing access to AP, IB, and honors courses for all students, and addressing discipline disparities through PBIS (Positive Behavior Interventions and Support). Fifty- five staff member are being trained in restorative practices. Eighteen days missed of school is considered a chronic problem. Suspension also counts as days absent. Knox Co Schools will be working on their Strategic Plan for the next five years this school year.
